MODAL AUXILIARY VERBS are one type of auxiliary verb. They include can, could, may, might, should, had better, must, will, would, and others discussed in this chapter. Modals differ from be, have, and do as auxiliary verbs in the specific ways discussed in Box 44-1 on page 522.

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Modals, also known as modal verbs mix with another verb to point mood or tense. All the auxiliary verbs except be, do and have are called Modals. 7.4 Auxiliaries Auxiliaries are what you might have called “helping verbs” when you first learned about grammar: they help a lexical verb by providing grammatical information about a verb’s tense or aspect, or other subtle elements of meaning. There are nine modal auxiliaries, which never change their form because they are never inflected.

modal auxiliaries English auxiliary verbs in the I position that are not inflected for agreement with the subject (ex: may, can, will, must, could) but may show tense (ex: could, would may be past) nonlexical (functional) categories

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Modal auxiliaries express uncertainty (might), necessity (must, should), and possibility (can). Modals do not have agreement or tense endings (hence * he cans ; * I am canning to go); they are the first to occur in a sequence of auxiliaries; and do not require an affix on the verb following them (He can walk , but not: * He can walked).

Modal verbs are helping/auxiliary verbs that express ideas like

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ability, necessity, lack of obligation, and prohibition. Many modal verbs have more than one meaning. ... For homework last night, we had to read Chapters 4 and 6, but we didn't have to read Chapter 5. Question: Did we have to read Chapter 5 last night? No, we didn't.
